
Primary principals welcome Labor education funding commitment

The Australian Primary Principals Association (APPA) welcomes the Labor Party's commitment to fully implement and fund school education based on the School Funding arrangements proposed in the Review of Funding for Schooling (Gonski Review).

APPA President, Dennis Yarrington, said that today's announcement is important for primary schools across the country.

Mr Yarrington said,
